




This week's activities link to the following articles:


Year 1

This week in English, we looked at a new book called 'The Lion Inside'. The children then wrote sentences comparing the main characters in the story. Some of the children were able to use 'but' to connect their ideas. In Maths, we used a tens frame to add amounts together. We then had to write number sentences to represent it.

We had lots of fun in our Science lesson where we explored our taste buds. We got to taste something that is sweet, sour, spicy and liquid! We then discussed the texture and the taste of each item.

Leaders have explored the part-whole model in Maths with children. We learned to gesture the part-whole model. Children learned to understand how to summarise the part-whole model with an addition number sentence.

This term children are exploring the drawing and painting unit in Art, experimenting with mark making and textures. Children have learned about the artist John Northcote Nash and his painting, titled 'A View from the Avon' or underground.





Year 5

Year 5 has engaged in a critical evaluation of the stereotypes associated with the Vikings utilising secondary sources of information, including illustrations and paintings. They formulated inferences and deductions by scrutinising visual representations that characterised the Vikings as fierce combatants, invaders, raiders, and other portrayals. They deliberated on the diverse actions and gestures employed to depict the Vikings in the roles of raiders and fighters, articulating their perspectives on whether these representations provided a balanced viewpoint or not. Subsequently, they conducted comparative analyses with an alternative collection of images that illustrated the Vikings as settlers, traders, and engineers, exchanging their viewpoints through agreement and disagreement.

Ultimately, they examined images of Viking artefacts and arrived at their own conclusions regarding Viking civilisation.



Year 3


This week, Year 3 had a busy and exciting time! In science, we learned all about muscles, how they work, and their importance in our bodies. In Maths, we practised addition and subtraction, building our confidence with different strategies. During Geography, we explored the counties and cities of the UK, learning about important places around the country and where most of the agriculture derives from. Finally, in RHE, we discussed the importance of love and care for our families, reflecting on how we can show kindness and support at home

Overall, Year 3 have shown wonderful enthusiasm and progress across all areas.

Year 6

The year 6 children have been learning about the difference between climate and weather in their Geography lessons. The children looked at the data for 5 cities in Brazil and created their own climate graphs to compare the rainfall and temperature for each of the cities. This enabled them to answer the question of why Roy Hodgson did not want the England football team to play their World Cup match in the 2014 tournament in Manaus. If you would like the answer to the question, ask your children.

In English, students have been busy writing their final diary entries for the character Will from the book 'War Game' based around the Christmas Truce game that took place during WW1 in 1914. The Year 6 team have enjoyed reading the writing that the children have produced using their tool kits. Well done children!
