Reception

Reception children have been enjoying "For our Funny Bones" story. We explored some funny bones and created our own.

Year 2



Wow - it's our last week of Autumn 1. How time flies by! We have continued to develop our understanding of our story by learning about frozen tableaux which help us to think about a moment in time in the story and consider how a character might be thinking or feeling using actions and facial expressions. We really enjoyed this lesson!

Year 1

The children in Year 1 have really enjoyed their class book in English, 'The Lion Inside'. This week, we talked about the main characters in the story, and then used adjectives to describe them.

The children also scribed sentences of a time they were brave, using the word 'because' in their writing.

Maths, involved solving addition questions. We also looked at word problems involving addition.

In Science, we discussed the difference between an object and a material. We then explored a range of everyday objects, and talked about its materials.





Year 5

In Art, Year 5 have been producing botanical drawings inspired by an American artist, Francesca Anderson, who is famous for her botanical drawings. Children started the unit by reading a biography on the artist and then answering comprehension style questions, mainly retrieval questions. Next, children were taught the elements in Art, for example line, shape, form, value, space, texture and colour. In order to show their understanding of the objective, children were provided with an image, which they had to comment on, using words and phrases.



Since Francesca Anderson uses light and dark values to create form (depth), the children experimented with values. They learnt that by experimenting with the pressure applied to the pencil and using different grades of pencils, you could create form. Children have been practising recreating images, focusing on the elements- shape and value. Finally, children have also been learning the relevant skills to evaluate their drawings, considering what went well and areas for development.

Year 3

This week, Year 3 have visited the Redbridge Museum as part of our exploration of our local area., where we have learnt more about history and the significance of Stone Age cave art. As part of our class activities, we have also been working on publishing our information text, "How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth," which ties into our Literacy and History lessons. Additionally, in Design and Technology, we have been practicing stitching techniques as we work on creating our own pin cushions. This has been a great opportunity to develop our practical skills and creativity this term and we look forward to the next half term!








Year 6
