Nursery

This week in Nursery we shared the story 'My Five Senses'. The children have been learning about seeing, smelling, touching, tasting and hearing.

We have also been exploring repeating patterns, such as 'red, blue, red, blue, red, blue'. The children really enjoyed having the opportunity to practise making patterns with finger paint.

We had a fire drill practice on Wednesday morning and are really proud of how all of the children responded so sensibly. Well done!

Reception

Our topic is People Who Help Us. We are using junk modelling to make vehicles that people who help us use. We are learning to join different materials together.

As you can see, we're using lots of different materials, and experimenting on the best ways to join them.



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Year 2

This week in Art, we continued to build on our drawing skills by developing our observations with a focus on shape, lines and tones. The children were immersed in their learning as they used a picture of themselves and a mirror to support their observation. Take a look below to see an example of one of the students work.



Year 3

Year 3 stepped into the shoes of archaeologists as part of their History lessons. They took part in an archaeological dig, unearthing Stone Age artefacts and carefully examining them to understand how early humans lived and survived. Through this hands-on experience, the children gained a real sense of what life was like thousands of years ago, connecting the past to the present in a meaningful way.

In Science, Year 3 were fascinated by the world of light. They explored the properties of different materials, discovering what makes an object opaque, translucent, or transparent. Through a variety of experiments, the children observed how light interacts with different substances.

Year 1

We continued exploring the text 'Lost in the Toy Museum' in English this week. The children were tasked to write a letter in first person, stating why they (Winkie) ran away from the toy museum. We have been focusing on subtraction in Maths. We explored the operation and were then tasked to solve the subtraction number sentence using a number line and the crossing out method.

In History, we took a closer look at teddy bears and investigated how they have changed over time. We then ordered them on a timeline. It was lovely seeing our children come to school wearing cultural clothes on Wednesday. Thank you to those parents who volunteered to come and speak about their culture to the children.




Year 5

Year 5 braced the cold weather this week and ventured into the financial district in the City of London. They visited the Bank of England Museum where they learned some facts about the modern economy. Founded in 1964, the building is home to many vaults of gold, some of which the children even got to hold!

Whilst the children walked around Threadneedle Street they made observations about the use of buildings in the area. They collected data from their findings, in the form of a tally chart and will explore the human geographical uses of the buildings in the financial district back in their classroom in the coming weeks.





primary sources on Ancient Egypt and presented their findings as emergent historians using historical vocabulary. Children confidently talked about polytheism- the ancient Egyptian belief in many gods and goddesses, their belief in the Afterlife, the Book of the Dead that was a collection of charms, spells and prayers, pyramids and the Scarab Beetle. Redbridge Museum: All of the year 6 classes visited Redbridge Museum on Thursday and Friday for a special workshop covering the topic of WW2 which they will be studying next term for History. The session allowed the students to see resources and items from the war and study stories of soldiers who were involved in fighting the war and resided in the local area. The children enjoyed the session and left the museum

with a wealth of knowledge.
